How does solar energy enter a building through glazing?

The amount of solar energy that enters a building through glazing is a strong function of the solar angle of incidence (see Figure 2 A). Over the course of a day, our model shows changes in the absorptivity, transmissivity, and reflectivity of the glazing as the solar angle changes (Figures 2B and 2C).
