Why is Mali building a new solar power plant?

As Mali grapples with an ongoing electricity crisis that hampers economic growth, transitional President Assimi Goita laid the foundation stone for a new 200 MW photovoltaic solar power plant. The Russian company NovaWind, a subsidiary of Rosatom, is constructing the plant, marking a significant step in the country's energy sector.

Why is Mali launching a 200 MWp solar power plant?

Loading... Mali's President Assimi Goita has launched a 200 MWp solar power plant project with NovaWind, a Rosatom subsidiary, to address the nation's electricity crisis and promote sustainable energy. The EUR200 million investment aims to supply 10% of Mali's electricity within 12 months.

How much energy does Mali produce?

A May 2023 report by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) stated that in 2020, Mali had a production capacity of 1,024.92 MW, including 162 MW from self-producers - all thermal. Electricity production stood 2,577.44 GWh, comprising 69% thermal energy, 26.8% hydroelectricity, and 4.2% solar.

What is Mali's first IPP solar project?

The EUR77 million (\$91.3 million) PV plant is Mali's first IPP solar project. Akuo Energy secured a 28-year power purchase agreement for the array from Mali's power utility, Energie du Mali-SA, in October 2015.

Will Mali develop nuclear power in 2023?

In October 2023, Mali and Russia agreed to develop civil nuclear power, according to Voice of America (VOA). The construction of two additional 200 MW solar power plants near Bamako is set to begin on May 28 and June 1. The electricity sector in Mali heavily relies on imported fossil fuels for thermal production.

Where does Mali get its electricity from?

The other source is the Manantali dam, in Mali, which stores about 11 billion cubic meters of water. The nearby Manantali 200 MW hydropower station is the main one in the region and, supplies 55 percent of its electricity to Mali, while the rest is equally shared between Mauritania and Senegal.

Touna Solar Power Station, is a planned 93 MW (125,000 hp) solar power plant in Mali. The privately owned power plant is expected to sell the power produced to the national electric utility, Energie du Mali (EDM-SA), under a power purchase agreement, which has already been signed, as of December 2020.

In 2019, PAN-AFRICAN SOLEIL HOLDINGS PTE. LTD. (PASH GLOBAL) acquired a 49.9 percent share in the solar photovoltaic (pv) farm project in Mali being developed by independent renewable energy power producer Akuo Energy. PASH made its investment while the Project was in development.



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Since mid-May, Mali has seen a major breakthrough: Assimi GOÏTA inaugurated construction work on three solar power plants. These costly projects will make a significant contribution to the country's energy sovereignty in the medium term.

The Amea Power Group has been awarded the contract for the construction and operation (for 25 years) of a 50 MW photovoltaic solar power plant in Mali. The plant will supply the populations of the Koulikoro region with electricity. The first results are expected within a year.

Solar plant achieves full electrification. The two Solar Power Center consist of a solar-PV system with a total output of 153 kWp and a 230 kWh battery energy storage system each, which feed into the existing mini-grids. The newly added systems will achieve cost-effective full electrification "24/7" in the villages.

Kita Solar Power Station (French: Centrale solaire de Kita) is a 50 MW (67,000 hp) solar power plant in Mali. At the time of its commissioning, in April 2020, it was the largest, grid-connected solar power station in West Africa.

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Located some 180 km west of Bamako, in Mali's Kayes Region, this 50 MWp solar plant injected its first kilowatt-hours into the Malian power grid in March 2020. The Kita solar plant is actively participating in the increase in the country's electrification rate, an essential parameter for economic and social development.

Segou Solar PV Park is a ground-mounted solar project which is planned over 47 hectares. The project is expected to generate 57,000MWh electricity and supply enough clean energy to power 60,000 households. The project is expected to offset 33,000t of carbon dioxide emissions (CO2) a year. The solar power project consists of 104,764 modules.

Sanankoroba Solar Power Station is a 200 MW (270,000 hp) solar power plant under construction in Mali. The power plant is in development under a public private partnership (PPP) arrangement between the government of Mali and NovaWind, a subsidiary of ...

The power station is a joint venture between Akuo Energy, an independent energy producer, based in France, and Pash Global, an investment company. Together, they own Akuo Kita Solar, the special purpose vehicle company that owns and operates the power station. The power generated is purchased by the Malian public electric utility company, Electricité du Mali, ...
